In Hebrew, the book of Psalms is entitled *tehillim*, which (when translated) means "songs of praise." As we look at the psalms, though, the laments substantially outnumber the songs of praise. In what sense then is this book characterized as *tehillim*? A close examination of the Psalter suggests and answer. A decided shift takes place as we move from the beginning of the book to its end. As we move toward the end, praise overtakes lament until at the very end of the book we have a virtual fireworks of praise...In a real sense, the book of Psalms moves us from mourning to joy (Longman 45).

- What do you think of the above quote? How does the book of Psalms move us from mourning to joy? Does this suggest anything about what sincere worship should produce in the life of a Christian?

The Psalms Today

What makes the book of Psalms so relevant today? Here are just a few reasons:

- 1. The vast majority of the psalms do not include historical details in the titles. Since most of the psalms are not tied by their titles to a specific event in history, they are timeless, allowing us to identify more easily with the ideas in each psalm based on our own personal experiences.
- 2. As mentioned earlier in the introduction, the psalms give us a fuller picture of the nature and character of God
- 3. In many ways, the book of Psalms is representative of the entire Old Testament. Many of the major events and themes that span the Old Testament story are reflected in the psalms. For example, there are psalms about everything from the creation of the world to the captivity of Judah. We read about the problem of suffering, the consequences of sin, the joy of forgiveness, the importance of God's laws, and the fate of the righteous & the wicked.
- 4. Understanding the psalms helps us to better understand the New Testament. There is no book quoted in the New Testament more often than the book of Psalms. By paying attention to the original context of these quotations, we are better able to figure out what the New Testament writers meant when they quoted from the psalms.
- 5. Since the psalms were written by people who were part of the covenant God made with Israel, they give us insight into what it means to have a covenant relationship with God. While there are <u>major</u> differences between the old and new covenants, the psalms still help us understand how a covenant works.
- 6. Yet another part of the enormous appeal of the psalms comes from the broad spectrum of emotions that are expressed throughout the book. No matter what emotion you are experiencing, chances are good that you can find a psalm that addresses it. Not only do the psalmists express these emotions, but they also express them within the framework of God's inspiration! Have you ever struggled with emotions like doubt, anger, fear, or depression, and then felt guilty just for thinking that way? The psalmists did. Not only do they show us that these emotions are not inherently bad, but they also show us how to express such emotions honestly in a way that still pleases God.
- 7. The psalms give us an inside-out view of what it looks like to have a heart that is completely devoted to God. Reading through the books of Samuel, Kings, and Chronicles will show us how a godly person like David *acts*, but they can only give us a view of his life from the outside looking in. Reading through Psalms, on the other hand, will show us how a godly person like David *thinks*. Not only do the psalms show us what a godly heart looks like from the inside-out, but they are filled with instructions that are designed to create that kind of heart in each of us. If we

- thoughtfully consider and listen to the words of the psalms, our hearts and our worship will radically change.
- 8. One of the greatest things about the book of Psalms is that it points the way to Jesus. Some psalms include very clear prophecies about events in His life or the work that He came to do. Other psalms seem to contain only veiled references to His coming. While Christ may not have been specifically in the minds of the psalmists as they wrote, He was certainly in the mind of the God who inspired the words of the psalms. Many psalms have both an immediate context that applies to events in the life of the writer, and a Messianic context that is fulfilled later by events in the life of Jesus.

Categories of Psalms

Keep in mind that these are only *general* categories. There is no single correct way to divide the psalms by type, so you may find that the categories differ from one commentary to another. You may also discover that many of the psalms can fit into more than category. The following chart gives a basic list of the some of the most common categories of psalms.

Introduction

What are some of the advantages of writing poetry instead of prose (prose is the writing style that resembles normal conversation)? What are some of the disadvantages?

Two of the most common characteristics of Hebrew poetry are *parallelism* and *imagery*.

Parallelism

Parallelism is:

In Hebrew poetry, the second phrase is always related to the first phrase, so the second phrase carries forward the thought found in the first phrase in some way. If there are only two phrases that are parallel, it's called a *bicolon*. Three parallel phrases is called a *tricolon*. There are several basic types of parallelism we will see as we study the psalms.

- <u>3</u> For I was envious of the arrogant, As I saw the prosperity of the wicked.
- <u>4</u> For there are no pains in their death; And their body is fat.
- <u>5</u> They are not in trouble as other men; Nor are they plagued like mankind.
- <u>6</u> Therefore pride is their necklace; The garment of violence covers them.
- <u>7</u> Their eye bulges from fatness; The imaginations of their heart run riot.

- <u>2</u> Thou hast given him his heart's desire, And Thou hast not withheld the request of his lips. Selah.
- <u>3</u> For Thou dost meet him with the blessings of good things; Thou dost set a crown of fine gold on his head.
- <u>4</u> He asked life of Thee, Thou didst give it to him, Length of days forever and ever.
- <u>5</u> His glory is great through Thy salvation, Splendor and majesty Thou dost place upon him.
- <u>6</u> For Thou dost make him most blessed forever; Thou dost make him joyful with gladness in Thy presence.
- <u>7</u> For the king trusts in the LORD, And through the lovingkindness of the Most High he will not be shaken.

- 19 And blessed be His glorious name forever; And may the whole earth be filled with His glory. Amen, and Amen.
- <u>20</u> The prayers of David the son of Jesse are ended.

Lesson 8 Penitential

Penitential Psalms: 6, 32, 38, 51, 102, 130, 143

PSALM 6

For the choir director; with stringed instruments, upon an eight-stringed lyre. A Psalm of David.

- <u>1</u> O LORD, do not rebuke me in Thine anger, Nor chasten me in Thy wrath.
- <u>2</u> Be gracious to me, O LORD, for I am pining away; Heal me, O LORD, for my bones are dismayed.
- <u>3</u> And my soul is greatly dismayed; But Thou, O LORD how long?
- <u>4</u> Return, O LORD, rescue my soul; Save me because of Thy lovingkindness.
- <u>5</u> For there is no mention of Thee in death; In Sheol who will give Thee thanks?
- <u>6</u> I am weary with my sighing; Every night I make my bed swim, I dissolve my couch with my tears.
- <u>7</u> My eye has wasted away with grief; It has become old because of all my adversaries.
- <u>8</u> Depart from me, all you who do iniquity, For the LORD has heard the voice of my weeping.
- <u>9</u> The LORD has heard my supplication, The LORD receives my prayer.
- 10 All my enemies shall be ashamed and greatly dismayed; They shall turn back, they shall suddenly be ashamed.

- A Psalm of David. A Maskil.
- <u>1</u> How blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, Whose sin is covered!
- <u>2</u> How blessed is the man to whom the LORD does not impute iniquity, And in whose spirit there is no deceit!
- <u>3</u> When I kept silent about my sin, my body wasted away Through my groaning all day long.
- <u>4</u> For day and night Thy hand was heavy upon me; My vitality was drained away as with the fever heat of summer. Selah.
- <u>5</u> I acknowledged my sin to Thee, And my iniquity I did not hide; I said, "I will confess my transgressions to the LORD"; And Thou didst forgive the guilt of my sin. Selah.
- <u>6</u> Therefore, let everyone who is godly pray to Thee in a time when Thou mayest be found; Surely in a flood of great waters they shall not reach him.
- <u>7</u> Thou art my hiding place; Thou dost preserve me from trouble; Thou dost surround me with songs of deliverance. Selah.
- <u>8</u> I will instruct you and teach you in the way which you should go; I will counsel you with My eye upon you.
- <u>9</u> Do not be as the horse or as the mule which have no understanding, Whose trappings include bit and bridle to hold them in check, Otherwise they will not come near to you.
- <u>10</u> Many are the sorrows of the wicked; But he who trusts in the LORD, lovingkindness shall surround him.
- 11 Be glad in the LORD and rejoice, you righteous ones, And shout for joy, all you who are upright in heart.

- For the choir director. A Psalm of David, when Nathan the prophet came to him, after he had gone in to Bathsheba.
- <u>1</u> Be gracious to me, O God, according to Thy lovingkindness; According to the greatness of Thy compassion blot out my transgressions.
- 2 Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, And cleanse me from my sin.
- <u>3</u> For I know my transgressions, And my sin is ever before me.
- <u>4</u> Against Thee, Thee only, I have sinned, And done what is evil in Thy sight, So that Thou art justified when Thou dost speak, And blameless when Thou dost judge.
- <u>5</u> Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, And in sin my mother conceived me.
- <u>6</u> Behold, Thou dost desire truth in the innermost being, And in the hidden part Thou wilt make me know wisdom.
- <u>7</u> Purify me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; Wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.
- <u>8</u> Make me to hear joy and gladness, Let the bones which Thou hast broken rejoice.
- <u>9</u> Hide Thy face from my sins, And blot out all my iniquities.
- <u>10</u> Create in me a clean heart, O God, And renew a steadfast spirit within me.
- 11 Do not cast me away from Thy presence, And do not take Thy Holy Spirit from me.
- <u>12</u> Restore to me the joy of Thy salvation, And sustain me with a willing spirit.
- 13 Then I will teach transgressors Thy ways, And sinners will be converted to Thee.
- <u>14</u> Deliver me from bloodguiltiness, O God, Thou God of my salvation; Then my tongue will joyfully sing of Thy righteousness.
- 15 O Lord, open my lips, That my mouth may declare Thy praise.
- <u>16</u> For Thou dost not delight in sacrifice, otherwise I would give it; Thou art not pleased with burnt offering.
- <u>17</u> The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; A broken and a contrite heart, O God, Thou wilt not despise.
- 18 By Thy favor do good to Zion; Build the walls of Jerusalem.
- <u>19</u> Then Thou wilt delight in righteous sacrifices, In burnt offering and whole burnt offering; Then young bulls will be offered on Thine altar.

Lesson 9 Messianic

Messianic Psalms: 2, 20-24, 41, 68, 118

- <u>1</u> Why are the nations in an uproar, And the peoples devising a vain thing?
- <u>2</u> The kings of the earth take their stand, And the rulers take counsel together Against the LORD and against His Anointed:
- <u>3</u> "Let us tear their fetters apart, And cast away their cords from us!"
- <u>4</u> He who sits in the heavens laughs, The Lord scoffs at them.
- <u>5</u> Then He will speak to them in His anger And terrify them in His fury:
- <u>6</u> "But as for Me, I have installed My King Upon Zion, My holy mountain."
- <u>7</u> "I will surely tell of the decree of the LORD: He said to Me, 'Thou art My Son, Today I have begotten Thee.
- <u>8</u> 'Ask of Me, and I will surely give the nations as Thine inheritance, And the very ends of the earth as Thy possession.
- <u>9</u> 'Thou shalt break them with a rod of iron, Thou shalt shatter them like earthenware.'"
- <u>10</u> Now therefore, O kings, show discernment; Take warning, O judges of the earth.
- 11 Worship the LORD with reverence, And rejoice with trembling.
- <u>12</u> Do homage to the Son, lest He become angry, and you perish in the way, For His wrath may soon be kindled. How blessed are all who take refuge in Him!

- For the choir director. A Psalm of David. A Song.
- <u>1</u> Let God arise, let His enemies be scattered; And let those who hate Him flee before Him.
- 2 As smoke is driven away, so drive them away; As wax melts before the fire, So let the wicked perish before God.
- <u>3</u> But let the righteous be glad; let them exult before God; Yes, let them rejoice with gladness.
- 4 Sing to God, sing praises to His name; Lift up a song for Him who rides through the deserts, Whose name is the LORD, and exult before Him.
- <u>5</u> A father of the fatherless and a judge for the widows, Is God in His holy habitation.
- <u>6</u> God makes a home for the lonely; He leads out the prisoners into prosperity, Only the rebellious dwell in a parched land.
- <u>7</u> O God, when Thou didst go forth before Thy people, When Thou didst march through the wilderness, Selah. <u>8</u> The earth quaked; The heavens also dropped rain at the presence of God; Sinai itself quaked at the presence of God, the God of Israel.
- <u>9</u> Thou didst shed abroad a plentiful rain, O God; Thou didst confirm Thine inheritance, when it was parched. <u>10</u> Thy creatures settled in it; Thou didst provide in Thy goodness for the poor, O God.
- 11 The Lord gives the command; The women who proclaim the good tidings are a great host:
- 12 "Kings of armies flee, they flee, And she who remains at home will divide the spoil!"
- 13 When you lie down among the sheepfolds, You are like the wings of a dove covered with silver, And its pinions with glistening gold.
- <u>14</u> When the Almighty scattered the kings there, It was snowing in Zalmon.
- 15 A mountain of God is the mountain of Bashan; A mountain of many peaks is the mountain of Bashan.
- <u>16</u> Why do you look with envy, O mountains with many peaks, At the mountain which God has desired for His abode? Surely, the LORD will dwell there forever.
- <u>17</u> The chariots of God are myriads, thousands upon thousands; The Lord is among them as at Sinai, in holiness.
- 18 Thou hast ascended on high, Thou hast led captive Thy captives; Thou hast received gifts among men, Even among the rebellious also, that the LORD God may dwell there.

- 19 Blessed be the Lord, who daily bears our burden, The God who is our salvation. Selah.
- <u>20</u> God is to us a God of deliverances; And to GOD the Lord belong escapes from death.
- <u>21</u> Surely God will shatter the head of His enemies, The hairy crown of him who goes on in his guilty deeds.
- <u>22</u> The Lord said, "I will bring them back from Bashan. I will bring them back from the depths of the sea;
- 23 That your foot may shatter them in blood, The tongue of your dogs may have its portion from your enemies."
- <u>24</u> They have seen Thy procession, O God, The procession of my God, my King, into the sanctuary.
- <u>25</u> The singers went on, the musicians after them, In the midst of the maidens beating tambourines.
- <u>26</u> Bless God in the congregations, Even the LORD, you who are of the fountain of Israel.
- <u>27</u> There is Benjamin, the youngest, ruling them, The princes of Judah in their throng, The princes of Zebulun, the princes of Naphtali.
- <u>28</u> Your God has commanded your strength; Show Thyself strong, O God, who hast acted on our behalf.
- <u>29</u> Because of Thy temple at Jerusalem Kings will bring gifts to Thee.
- <u>30</u> Rebuke the beasts in the reeds, The herd of bulls with the calves of the peoples, Trampling under foot the pieces of silver; He has scattered the peoples who delight in war.
- <u>31</u> Envoys will come out of Egypt; Ethiopia will quickly stretch out her hands to God.
- 32 Sing to God, O kingdoms of the earth; Sing praises to the Lord, Selah.
- 33 To Him who rides upon the highest heavens, which are from ancient times; Behold, He speaks forth with His voice, a mighty voice.
- <u>34</u> Ascribe strength to God; His majesty is over Israel, And His strength is in the skies.
- <u>35</u> O God, Thou art awesome from Thy sanctuary. The God of Israel Himself gives strength and power to the people. Blessed be God!

Lesson 10 Wisdom

Wisdom Psalms: 1, 19, 32, 34, 37, 49, 73, 91, 111-112, 119, 127-128, 133

PSALM 1

<u>1</u> How blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked,

Nor stand in the path of sinners,

Nor sit in the seat of scoffers!

2 But his delight is in the law of the LORD,

And in His law he meditates day and night.

<u>3</u> He will be like a tree *firmly* planted by streams of water,

Which yields its fruit in its season

And its leaf does not wither;

And in whatever he does, he prospers.

4 The wicked are not so,

But they are like chaff which the wind drives away.

5 Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment,

Nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.

6 For the LORD knows the way of the righteous,

But the way of the wicked will perish.

PSALM 34

A Psalm of David when he feigned madness before Abimelech, who drove him away and he departed.

1 I will bless the LORD at all times;

His praise shall continually be in my mouth.

2 My soul will make its boast in the LORD;

The humble will hear it and rejoice.

3 O magnify the LORD with me,

And let us exalt His name together.

4 I sought the LORD, and He answered me,

And delivered me from all my fears.

5 They looked to Him and were radiant,

And their faces will never be ashamed.

6 This poor man cried, and the LORD heard him

And saved him out of all his troubles.

<u>7</u> The angel of the LORD encamps around those who fear Him,

And rescues them.

<u>8</u> O taste and see that the LORD is good;

How blessed is the man who takes refuge in Him!

9 O fear the LORD, you His saints;

For to those who fear Him there is no want.

10 The young lions do lack and suffer hunger;

But they who seek the LORD shall not be in want of any good thing.

11 Come, you children, listen to me;

I will teach you the fear of the LORD.

12 Who is the man who desires life

And loves *length of* days that he may see good?

13 Keep your tongue from evil

And your lips from speaking deceit.

14 Depart from evil and do good;

Seek peace and pursue it.

15 The eyes of the LORD are toward the righteous

And His ears are open to their cry.

16 The face of the LORD is against evildoers,

To cut off the memory of them from the earth.

17 The righteous cry, and the LORD hears

And delivers them out of all their troubles.

18 The LORD is near to the brokenhearted

And saves those who are crushed in spirit.

19 Many are the afflictions of the righteous,

But the LORD delivers him out of them all.

20 He keeps all his bones,

Not one of them is broken.

21 Evil shall slay the wicked,

And those who hate the righteous will be condemned.

22 The LORD redeems the soul of His servants.

And none of those who take refuge in Him will be condemned.

PSALM 127

A Song of Ascents, of Solomon.

1 Unless the LORD builds the house,

They labor in vain who build it;

Unless the LORD guards the city,

To eat the bread of painful labors;

For He gives to His beloved even in his sleep.

3 Behold, children are a gift of the LORD,

The fruit of the womb is a reward.

4 Like arrows in the hand of a warrior,

So are the children of one's youth.

5 How blessed is the man whose quiver is full of them;

They will not be ashamed

When they speak with their enemies in the gate.

A Song of Ascents.

1 Out of the depths I have cried to You, O LORD.

2 Lord, hear my voice!

Let Your ears be attentive

<u>3</u> If You, LORD, should mark iniquities,

O Lord, who could stand?

4 But there is forgiveness with You,

That You may be feared.

5 I wait for the LORD, my soul does wait,

And in His word do I hope.

6 My soul waits for the Lord

More than the watchmen for the morning;

Indeed, more than the watchmen for the morning.

7 O Israel, hope in the LORD;

For with the LORD there is lovingkindness,

And with Him is abundant redemption.

8 And He will redeem Israel

From all his iniquities.
